**Captain's Message**

Child and Pedestrian Safety is the focus of West Traffic Division's (WTD) Traffic Education and Enforcement for the month of October. West Traffic officers, along with those assigned to the various Areas within the City of Los Angeles, will be conducting educational and enforcement activities in support of the following special events. "Drive Safely Work Week," is scheduled for October 3 through 7 and is sponsored by the Network of Employers for Traffic Safety. The International Forum on Traffic Records and Highway Safety Information Systems is scheduled for October 25 through 28, and is sponsored by the Association of Transportation Safety Information Professionals ([www.atsip.org](http://www.atsip.org)). Additionally, the International Association of Chiefs of Police Annual Conference and Expo, sponsored by various public and private organizations, is scheduled for October 15 through 18 in San Diego, California. The following California Vehicle Code (CVC) sections will be the focus for enforcing WTD's child and pedestrian safety message:

**21950(a) CVC** – Right-of-Way at Crosswalks: The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection.

**21951 CVC** – Vehicles Stopped for Pedestrians: When a vehicle is stopped at a marked or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to allow a pedestrian to cross the roadway, vehicles approaching from the rear *shall not* overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.

**21954(a) CVC** – Pedestrians Outside Crosswalk: Every pedestrian upon a roadway, except those traveling within a marked or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, shall yield the right-of-way to all vehicles in the roadway that are near enough to constitute an immediate hazard.

**21955 CVC** – Crossing Between Controlled Intersections: Pedestrians shall not cross the roadway at any place between adjacent intersections controlled by traffic control signal devices or police officers, except within a crosswalk.

**21453(b) CVC** – Right Turn on Red Light: A driver, after stopping for a steady circular red signal, may turn right. However, the driver shall yield the right-of-way to pedestrians lawfully within an adjacent crosswalk and to traffic using the cross street.

**21456 CVC** – Walk, Wait, or Don't Walk: (a) A pedestrian facing a "WALK" signal may proceed across the roadway in the direction of the signal, but shall yield the right-of-way to vehicles lawfully within the intersection at the time that signal is first shown. (b) No pedestrian shall start to cross the roadway in the direction of the signal while the "DON'T WALK" or "WAIT" or "Upraised Hand" symbol is showing.

**22106 CVC** – Starting Parked Vehicles or Backing: No person shall start a vehicle that is stopped, standing, or parked on a highway, nor shall any person back a vehicle on a highway until such movement can be made with reasonable safety.

Encouraging family members and friends to exercise greater caution to prevent loved ones from becoming a statistic should be a joint effort throughout the country's communities.

## **HALLOWEEN SAFETY**

For children, Halloween is one of the most fun times, and one of the most dangerous times of the year. Please take the time to review the following safety tips, and have a safe and enjoyable Halloween.

### **Before Nightfall on Halloween**

Plan and review with your children the route and behavior which is acceptable to you. Agree on a specific time when revelers must return home.

Remind all drivers to remain cautious and drive slowly throughout the community.

Adult partygoers should establish a designated driver.

### **When Trick-or-Treating**

A parent or responsible adult should always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds.

### **Remind Trick-or Treaters:**

- By using a flashlight, they can see and be seen by others.
- Remain on well-lit streets, and always use the sidewalk.
- If no sidewalk is available, walk at the farthest edge of the roadway facing traffic.
- Obey all traffic and pedestrian regulations.
- Always walk. Never run across a street.
- Only cross the street at corners or at established crosswalks.
- Remove any mask or item that will limit eyesight before crossing a street.
- Don't assume the right of way. Motorists may have trouble-seeing trick-or-treaters. Just because one car stops, doesn't mean others will!
- Stay in a group and communicate where the group will be going.
- Never cut across yards or use alleys.

*The police should be notified immediately of any suspicious or unlawful activity.*

## **COMMUNITY AND OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES**

It is the responsibility of motorists and pedestrians to observe all traffic laws as described in the California Vehicle Code (CVC). It is the responsibility of the Police Department to inform the community on the importance of traffic safety and to enforce the rules of the road as described in the CVC. The combined efforts of the community and the Police Department will help ensure the safety of motorists and pedestrians throughout the City.

The Community Traffic Services Unit (CTSU) is one of WTD's specialized units, which works to resolve particular community concerns. ### **Traffic Tips**

- \* **Look both ways twice before crossing the street.**
- \* **Watch out for pedestrians crossing streets in and outside of crosswalks, especially at night.**
- \* **Always wear your seatbelt.**
- \* **Don't drink and drive.**
- \* **Don't use handheld devices such as cell phones, MP3 players or GPS units while driving.**
- \* **Please slow down. Speed kills.**
